The Fremont Indians built homes and storage places in the red rocks. This is a landmark.





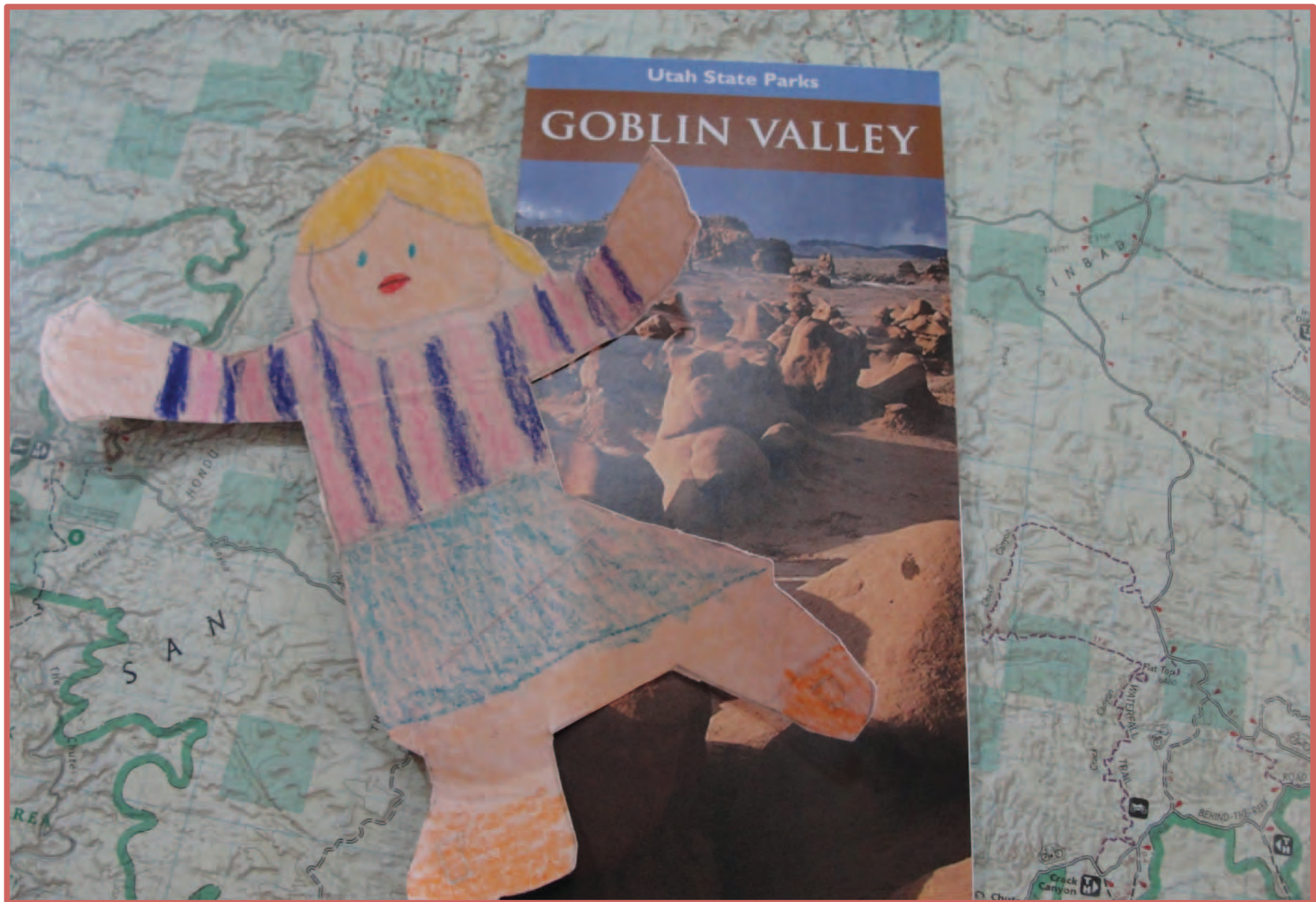
Red rock can be found all over southern Utah.

## Entrada Sandstone Formation

The goblins, made of reddish shale, siltstone and sandstone, are part of this formation. These rocks were formed from sediments deposited here on an ancient tidal flat. The reddish color is from hematite, an iron oxide.

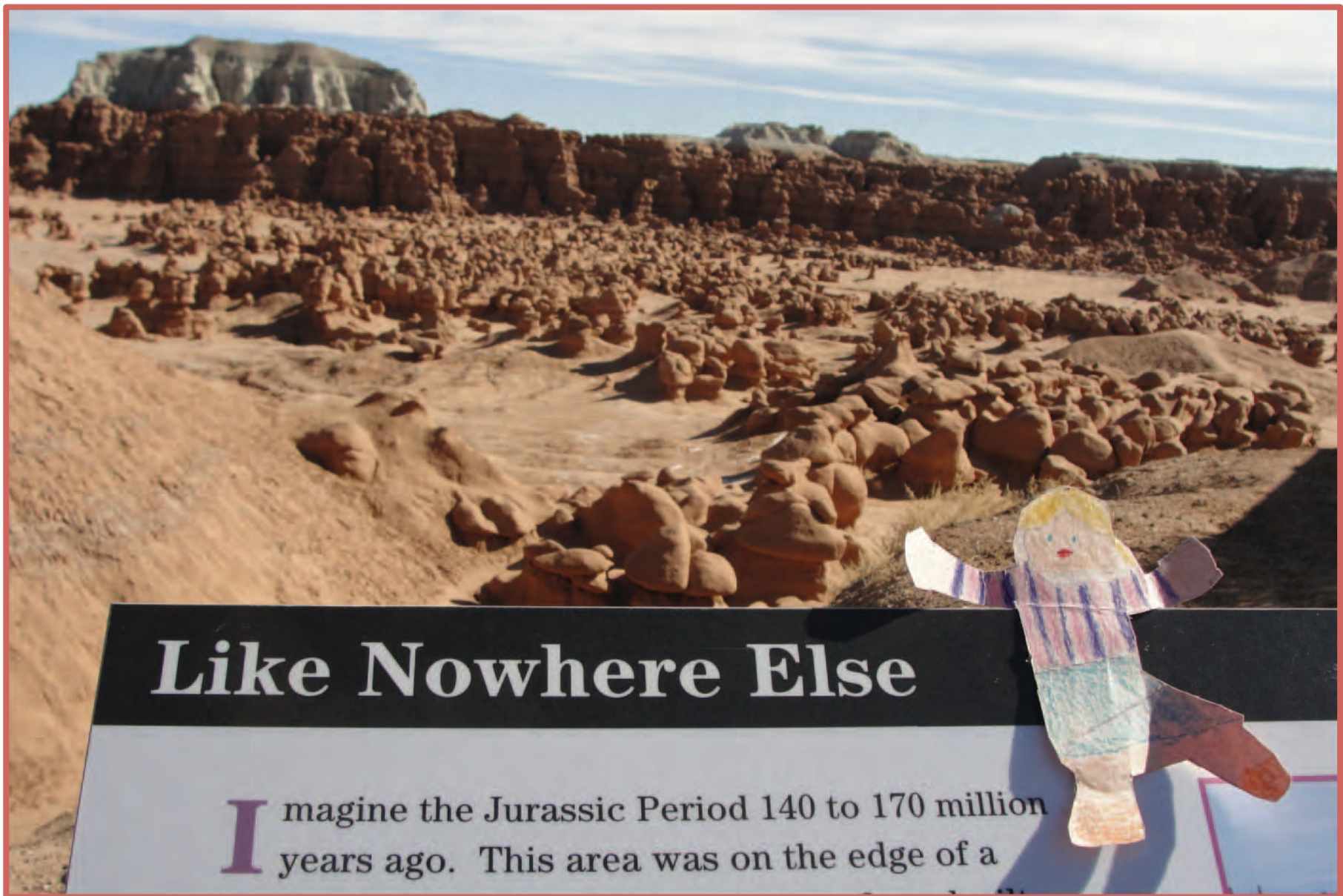

The valley is filled with interesting sandstone.



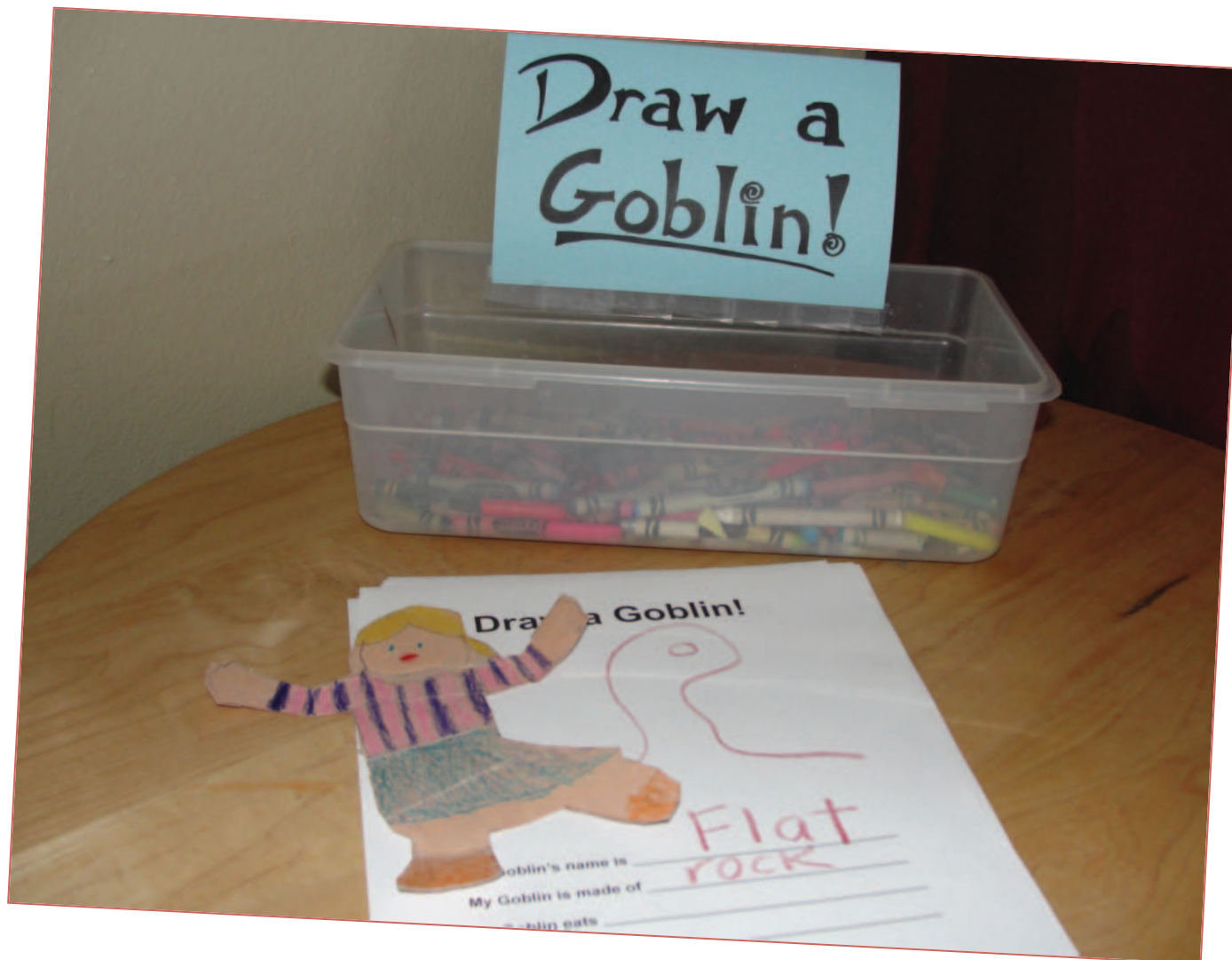
The rocks look like red mushrooms or goblins.



We had fun climbing on the rocks.



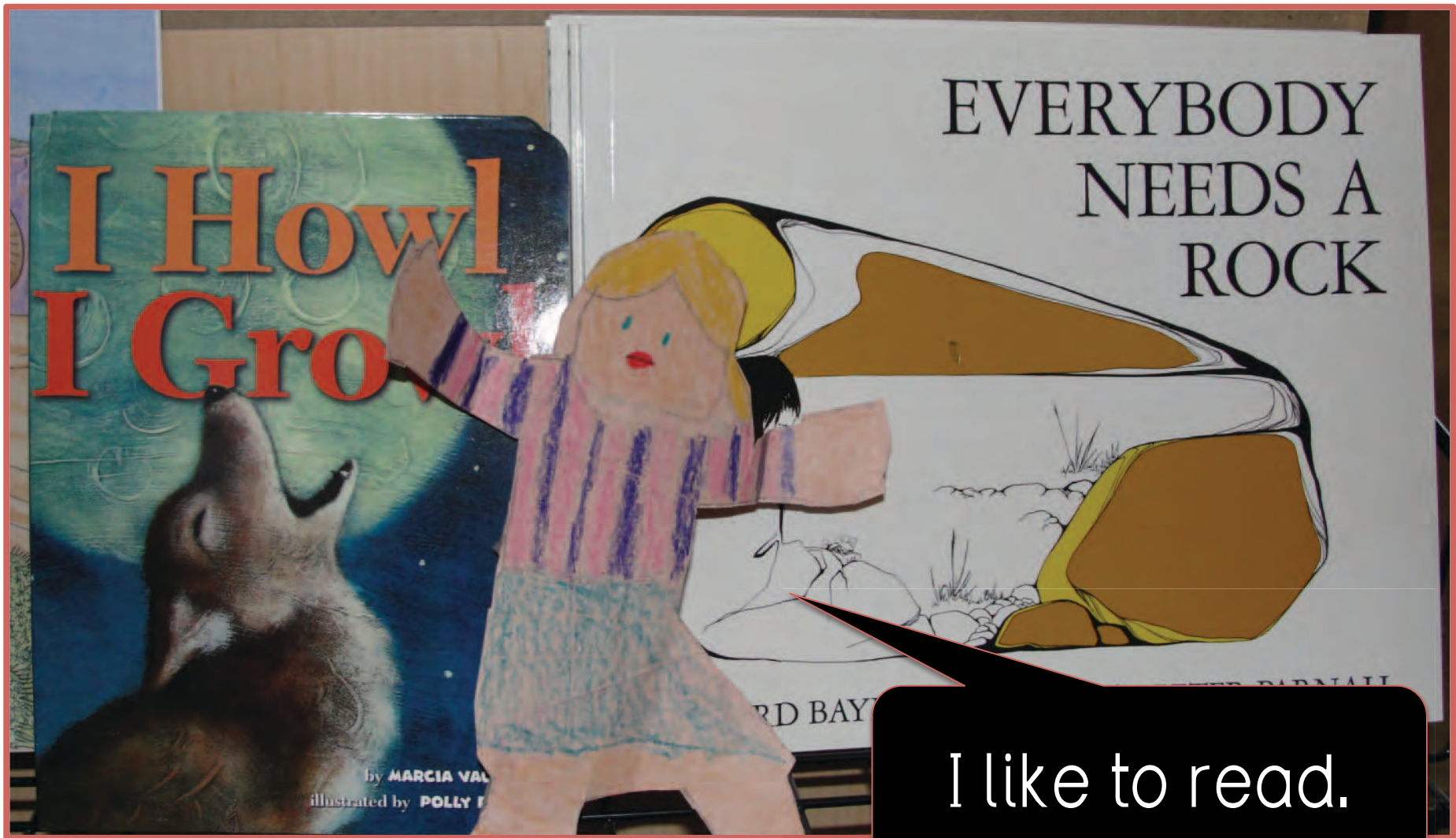
This place gets very muddy when it is wet.
